Dividing into sections

For a document as long as the project, I would consider dividing it up into sections with headings. The "development" at the beginning would then be essentially a guide to the sections. There could be one section for each of your reasons, for example. Or it might be natural to group together a claim and several related reasons within a section. The section headings provide "signposts" helping the reader navigate the document.

Within sections

Each section then has its own opening thesis statement and its own development, outlining the argument within the section. If a section corresponds to a reason, the section paragraphs would organize the various pieces of evidence for that reason. In this case, the opening thesis of the section would describe the reason in a bit more detail than the heading, and the development would summarize the pieces of evidence you will discuss for that reason.

Hierarchical use of the writing ideas in SCIE 113

Following the above advice is essential structuring each section more or less like a unit-writing essay, with a "super thesis / development" on top. The abstract also signals the top-level structure, and there will often be considerable overlap between the abstract and the introductory "super thesis / development".

Background

If your topic is specialized, it will be useful to have a short initial section giving some background. For example, if I wrote a project summarizing the research on the best way to teach a course like SCIE 113, it would be helpful to most readers to describe briefly the learning goals of the course first.
